At home as you prepare for the holidays or spring clean, if you have house plants that have become too large etc please drop them off at the conservatory on Mondays.


Any keen gardeners who have spare seedlings in Spring please could you share them with us so we can pass them on.

Thanks tons: looking forward to seeing you all in April!!!!!!







At 80 years old, Celia has been named the winner of the BBC Make a Difference Award for Volunteering, honouring her outstanding contribution and lifelong commitment to her community.

Celia's story is one of compassion, resilience, and an unwavering belief in the power of community spaces. A long-standing member of the Friends of Batley Library (FOBL), she previously served as Chairperson, where her determination was pivotal in saving the Batley Library building from closure. Thanks to her leadership, the library continues to thrive as a much-needed resource, bringing people together across generations.

But Celia's contributions extend far beyond committee meetings. She is the creative force behind the Together in Batley magazine, a free publication that she not only produces but also personally distributes. Her aim is simple but powerful: to connect people, especially those who are vulnerable or without access to the internet. Each issue celebrates local stories, groups, businesses, and activities, ensuring no member of the community is left behind.

At the library itself, Celia's warmth and creativity shine even brighter. She runs the popular Lego Club, where children gather to build, play, and learn, and she also cares for the much-loved Butterfly House, now the Wilton Park Conservatory, where she transported insects so young visitors could enjoy hands-on educational

experiences. These activities bring joy to families while sparking curiosity in the next generation.

What sets Celia apart, however, is her genuine kindness.

Known by many in Batley, she always takes the time to stop for a chat, offering a smile and a listening ear. For countless people, she has made the library feel like a welcoming home – a place where everyone belongs.

Winning the BBC Make a Difference Award is a fitting recognition of Celia's tireless efforts. Her work embodies the true spirit of volunteering: giving time, energy, and heart to improve the lives of others. As the library and community continue to flourish, Celia's impact will be felt for years to come.

Batley's Boat: HMS Badsworth

HMS Badsworth was an escort destroyer of the TYPE II Hunt Class. Cammel Laird laid down her keel on 15th May 1940.

Batley responded to the Warship Week National Savings campaign in March 1942 and adopted the ship'

She served with honour during the war round England, the Mediterranean and in Russian waters. She was loaned to the Royal Norwegian Navy on 8th August 1944 and re-named HNoMS Arendal and was de-commissioned from the Royal Navy in 16thNov 1944.

She was finally scrapped in 1965








Opening doors, connecting people, supporting you

During Heritage Open Days Week (12th September onwards) there was a display describing the amazing buildings around the Market Square. The display has been turned into a book which is available to view at the library.



Batley Market Square

Batley Market Place has long been the heart of the town, a sloping cobbled square positioned between the Town Hall and the Carnegie Library. Its role as a trading hub grew in tandem with Batley's rapid expansion during the 19th century, when the shoddy textile industry brought prosperity and population growth. The construction of major civic landmarks around the Market Place reinforced its status as a centre of both commerce and community life: the Town Hall, built in 1854, symbolised local governance, while the Carnegie Library, opened in 1907, reflected philanthropic investment in education and self-improvement. Together, they framed the Market Place as a civic and social stage.

Market-day life here was vivid and atmospheric. Stalls were quickly erected on wooden frames and covered in fabric, strung with chains of light that gave the square a magical feel, especially in the dim winter evenings. Traders sold goods that carried a strong local flavour, from pies and tripe to comics, with some stalls remembered fondly for their quirky buy-and-return systems. The market was further strengthened by Batley's strong transport links: the opening of the railway station in 1848 and tramway services made the Market Place easily accessible and reinforced its role as a bustling market town.

As Batley gained borough status in 1868, the Market Place became more than a trading centre—it was a civic stage, a place where democracy and local identity were expressed. Over the 20th century, the market retained its essential character. Photographs from the 1950s show the enduring layout of stalls set against the backdrop of grand Victorian buildings, a reminder of the continuity of town life.

Batley History Group offered a Walk through Batley's Past at Batley Cemetery, and Bagshaw Museum created a family friendly Building Trail and a Guided Museum Tour while The Friends of Batley Station celebrated with a Past and Present day

REAL GARDENERS DIARY/SECRET GARDEN/AUGUST 25

Secret as it is, there is nobody to complain if it gets a bit overgrown, as now; grass might quit at high temperatures but speedwell doesn't, nor do nettles, thistles, and a whole raft of other stuff unwelcome in my nice variegated sward.

Best to haul the lot out in armfuls and chuck it on the bonfire, hoping for rain so that I can plant up with primroses and violets on the edges. These are incredibly hardy and lovely natives and do better than anything else in unpredictable seasons.

I think it best to study a garden like this one, which still has bits of original woodland, and find out what does well rather than trying to impose petunias on it -the wind would blow them to fragments anyway.

Speaking of odd weather, it has been a good year for berries, rather early but prolific, and the scruffy plum tree which excited me enough to paint it in the spring has produced some strong flavoured plums, very bitter until very ripe, so it's a race between me and the wasps.

I haven't had much time this year to mess about trimming and weeding. Result -less bird damage on the strawberries, riotous juicy blackberries -and actual apples after 5 years! Can't find the gooseberries, but then, you can't have everything.

During my 50 plus years of exile, I dreamed about this garden and the peace I got from being in it. Of course, I didn't think about slugs, aphids, and giant dead Ash trees -even so, it's still my haven.

WOGGLE HOPPING FESTIVAL

Sunshine, blue skies, green grass and red letter boxes welcomed crowds into Batley's Wilton Park on Sunday August 2nd to enjoy the UK's first-ever Woggle Hopping Festival. The day's fun was a tribute to Batley Scoutmaster George Corner who invented the sport as a way of channeling his own irrepressible energy.

George's idea was to leapfrog over any object which was the same height as a woggle, which is the loop holding a Scout's neckerchief in place.

Woggle-making was a craft on offer on the day for everyone to make their own and try their skill at leaping over custom-made red letter boxes which were part of a parkour's circuit with professional trainers on hand.

The fun spread out over the grass with giant Jenga blocks, Batley beach, tin-can skittles, bean bag throwing, a bouncy castle, face painting, coconut shy and games of skill for all ages.

A play, "Skip" written by local poet and author Mohamed Saloo was performed by a cast of volunteers, telling the story of George's life and times.

Enthusiastic parents told the organisers they could not believe the event was free and were amazed at the range of games on offer. One parent said,

"Playing outside is something kids don't have much chance to do these days. The whole family is having a go!"

The event, which was jointly organised by the Friends of Batley Library, the Friends of Wilton Park and Batley History Group, is now set to become an annual date on Batley's calendar for the summer holidays.


